Stage 1 - School Life of the Past

Students are immersed in past daily school life through recreated lessons, outdoor activities and exploration of artefacts and other sources. They compare children's daily lives, use changing technologies and interpret features of a variety of objects and remains of the past. Supports *Present and Past Family Life* and *The Past in the Present*.

Stage 2 - Continuity and Change

Students use primary sources and immersive experiences to investigate the continuities and changes in education from the 1880s to the present. They compare teaching methods, use past teaching and learning tools and analyse sources such as artefacts, photos and learning spaces. Supports *Community and Remembrance*.

Step back in time & use objects past

Students can have the opportunity to:

- Experience an 1880s school lesson sitting at original long-toms
- **Dip** a pen in a ceramic ink well to write Copperplate with ink
- Write on slate boards with genuine slate pencils
- **Observe** student work samples treasured by generations
- Examine historic objects and discuss the evidence they hold
- **Print** with jelly pads and rubber stamps as early technologies
- **Explore** historic objects, images and sites to consider change and continuity over time
- **Experience** changing communication technologies such as telephones, projectors and hand printers
- **Unpack** and examine the contents of Globite suitcases
- Engage with story, rhyme and 'make-do' outdoor games
- Skip around a maypole to playful folk music
- Practise precision drill using wands or dumb-bells
- Manipulate wooden puzzle pieces and early craft materials
- Play with knuckles and marbles, spinning tops and string
- **Compare** communication and school through several eras of the past to that of today.

In winter the fires are alight and schools can opt for students to toast bread over the coals.
